1 · Context and key data¹ on HIV/AIDS worldwide and in L'Initiative-eligible countries (2023)

Context overview



The spread of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) continues to pose a major global public health challenge, especially in low-income countries. In 2022, one person died every minute from AIDS (acquired immunodeficiency syndrome). Without treatment, AIDS leads to opportunistic infections and diseases as the immune system deteriorates. While access to ART has improved, there is still much to be done to eradicate the pandemic, including facilitating access to health services for certain population groups.

Despite these obstacles and the absence of a preventive or curative vaccine, countries that invest heavily in a coordinated, collective response have seen promising progress. L'Initiative aligns with the Global AIDS Strategy 2021-2026, which calls on political, social and economic actors, as well as people living with HIV (PLHIV), to mobilize against the pandemic.



UNAIDS identifies the five main key population groups that are particularly vulnerable to HIV and often lack access to adequate services as:

Men who have sex with men

Transgender people

Sex workers

People who use or inject drugs

Prisoners and people in prison settings



Data specific to children and older people



Although children only accounted for 4% of all people living with HIV in 2021, this age group represented 15% of HIV-related deaths. Only **57% of children living with HIV are on ARV treatment**, compared to 77% of adults⁴.

Vertical HIV transmission data



Global data in 2023: **84% of pregnant** women living with HIV received antiretroviral drugs to reduce the risk of mother-to-child transmission of HIV, compared to 68.5% in L'Initiative-eligible countries⁵.

It is estimated that vertical transmission among children born to HIV-positive mothers in the past 12 months is 10% globally, compared to 17.3% in L'Initiative-eligible countries.

L'Initiative scales up and strengthens its support to the HIV response

L'Initiative's commitment to the fight against HIV has been steadily increasing since the first three-year term of activity (2011-2013), both in terms of the number of interventions – projects and technical assistance (TA) – and the amounts committed to the HIV response.


Evolution of commitments and level of interventions funded by intervention type to respond to HIV

Evolution of funding allocated by three-year period to the HIV response in relation to total amounts allocated by L'Initiative







L'Initiative's intervention budgets have been increasing over the different three-year periods. The budget allocation for HIV increased significantly between 2011 and 2019 (from 40% to nearly 65% of the overall budget for interventions supported by L'Initiative). During the 2020-2022 period there was a slight change of direction due to rebalancing towards interventions responding to other pandemics and to health systems strengthening.


Interventions concentrated in Sub-Saharan Africa and targeted at the most affected and vulnerable countries

Total budget for interventions



FOCUS ON THE LEAST DEVELOPED COUNTRIES (LDCs)



Over the last three-year period (2020-2022), 20 LDCs (including 13 from Francophone Africa) were supported by L'Initiative through one of its intervention modalities. 64 TA assignments (65% of HIV TAs) and 19 projects (nearly 56% of HIV projects) supported by L'Initiative for an amount of €34.7 million were implemented in LDCs between 2020 and 2022. This trend continues during the current period (2023-2025), with already €43.8 million committed for TA and HIV projects in LDCs.

Civil society and the response to HIV: L'Initiative's historic and sustainable support to NGOs

Distribution of projects by type of project lead (2011-2023)

8 out of 10 HIV projects funded by L'Initiative are implemented by civil society organizations (local NGOs, including community-based organizations and French NGOs/foundations with an international focus). Between 2011 and 2023, €106 million were committed to support civil society organizations (CSOs) to respond to HIV.



Operational research and HIV

L'Initiative supports scientific projects that have a significant impact on the HIV response and are put into practice at the country level. The purpose of this funding is to support and promote innovative solutions developed by projects, to ensure their efficiency in a given context and to promote their integration into national or international strategies.

The 2021 call for projects focused on **cervical cancer**: 3 projects were selected in 2022, which focused on both HIV and cervical cancer:



End beneficiaries of projects

L'Initiative's active projects have contributed to facilitating access to care, strengthening the capacities of health facilities and their staff, and changing health and institutional environments to improve HIV care and support.


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Equitable access to testing and treatment: a priority for key populations most at risk of HIV

Key populations

Key populations are more severely affected by the HIV and AIDS pandemic and often face limited access to health services. Widespread social rejection and discrimination, violence and harassment by state and non-state actors, restrictive laws and policies, and the criminalization of certain behaviors or practices increase their vulnerability and hinder their access to health services. Meaningful involvement of key populations is essential to ensure the delivery of quality services that meet their specific needs - they are central to an effective HIV response.

Globally, the average HIV prevalence among 15-49 year olds is 0.7%, yet among key populations it is:



LGBTQIA+ populations

41 HIV-related projects have supported at least one LGBTQIA+ population group since 2012, with a total funding commitment of **€46** million.

Examples of projects: CohMSM research projects providing access to HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) for men who have sex with men: acceptability and feasibility study in community clinics in West Africa.

In 2023, ongoing projects with LGBTQIA+ populations as their ultimate beneficiaries reported the following results:



Ukraine emergency fund

Since the expansion of the war in Ukraine, more than 13.5 million people, including people living with HIV and member of key populations, have been internally displaced or forced to seek refuge in neighboring countries, often losing access to health services in the process. HIV and TB prevention and diagnosis services have been disrupted, resulting in some people stopping treatment 9 10. In response to this challenge, L'Accélérateur funded 5 projects through its Ukraine Emergency Fund for a total of €5M.

HIV and stigma/discrimination

The "Community response to stigma and discrimination and legislative reform in West and Central Africa (WCA)" project, led by UNAIDS, aims to promote access to inclusive, human rights-focused HIV services for key populations, adolescents, young women and girls in 6 WCA countries: €1,921,519.


4 · L'Initiative's technical assistance in the HIV response

The average committed budget for technical assistance assignments focused on HIV and AIDS increased by more than 57% between the last two triennia, from €108.853 (2017-2019) to €171,151 (2020-2022).

1,216 technical expert roles were deployed through HIV TAs. The total doubled between the 2014-2016 period and the 2020-2022 one.

Technical support provided mainly to national coordination mechanisms, national programs, and local civil society

Type of TA recipients



CCMs and national programs are primary beneficiaries of technical expertise aimed at strengthening national HIV response strategies and supporting funding applications to the Global Fund. Countries receive focused support, particularly within the framework of HIV and HIV-TB grant application processes to the Global Fund.

Looking back at GC7: unprecedented support to strengthen funding requests in the fight against HIV

Under the Global Fund's new funding cycle (GC7 — implemented in most countries between 2024 and 2026), L'Initiative provided **47 GC7 TAs** with an HIV/AIDS component. They include reviews of national strategic plans (NSPs), support to write funding requests and support with grant-making for a committed value of €9.4 million, with 252 **technical expert roles**. Across all L'Initiative-eligible countries, the total amount for GC7 HIV allocations is **US \$2,433,882,006**.



A concentration of support focused on GC7 grants (including at least one HIV component) in Sub-Saharan Africa, particularly in the Sahel region, the Gulf of Guinea, and Central Africa.

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HIV across age groups

Overview of growing older and aging with HIV

According to UNICEF, there has been little progress in recent years in HIV prevention and treatment for children, adolescents and pregnant women. Globally, only half of all children living with HIV are receiving treatment.

Among adolescent populations ages 10 to 19, AIDS remains the leading cause of death in Sub-Saharan Africa, and the second leading cause of death in the world.

At the same time, thanks to advances in medical and scientific research and the widespread use of effective ART, AIDS-related mortality has significantly declined. People living with HIV are increasingly recognized as having a long-term, chronic condition – one that must be managed over time, including as they age.

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HIV among women and girls

Overview of the issue

The health status of individuals and their access to health services are largely determined by the social gender norms in their environment. Depending on the geographic location and social context, the care pathway differs depending on whether you are a woman or a man. Gender discrimination (family, cultural, political constraints) can be major barriers to testing, to the quality of care experience, to treatment adherence, and even the way that professional health interventions are structured.

The links between HIV, human papillomavirus (HPV) and cancers are well established: immunocompromised women are more vulnerable to HPV infection, which can progress to cervical cancer.

L'Initiative's interventions to combat HIV among young women and girls

Since 2012, **50 HIV projects specific to women and adolescent girls** have been committed for a budget of **€60.9 million**, including 2 phases of the "Access to PrEP for women" project in Morocco and Mauritius.

Since 2012, **32 HIV TAs** dedicated to women and adolescent girls have been committed for a budget of €3.5 million.

Project results in 2023¹³

Of the interventions that specifically target women:

- 3 operational research projects for the 2022 call for operational research projects focused on HIV/HPV co-infection and associated cancers. In addition with 6 other projects focused on cervical cancer and HIV funded by L'Initiative with a budget of €10.6 million.
- 5 TA assignments focused on cervical cancer and HIV were funded by L'Initiative for a budget of €0.5 million. For example: 1 expert assignment to Cambodia to set out and develop a national action plan for the screening and treatment of cercival cancer and papillomavirus infection among women living with HIV.

Through L'Accélérateur, L'Initiative is also funding phase 2 of the SUCCESS project (Scale Up Cervical Cancer Elimination), which aims to strengthen secondary prevention through HPV screening and the treatment of precancerous lesions by thermal ablation. The project's target is to screen 175,000 women, 40% of whom are living with HIV, in Guinea, Côte d'Ivoire, Benin, Togo and Burundi. (Budget of €5M)

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Gender projects (DAC 1 and 2)¹⁴

This scoring system is based on 3 values (0: does not target gender

In line with the SDGs and Expertise France's gender strategy, L'Initiative applies the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OEDC) Development Assistance Committee (DAC) aid gender equality policy marker in projects it supports.



Since the 2017 – 2019 three-year period, there has been positive progress in gender mainstreaming in HIV projects.
